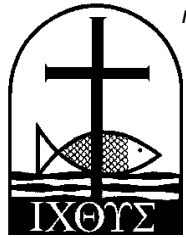

To guide us, Melissa Bellamy explained current housing legislation in Trenton and Washington D.C. and members used that information in their written comments to their representatives.
